



Greater Melbourne flood warning services

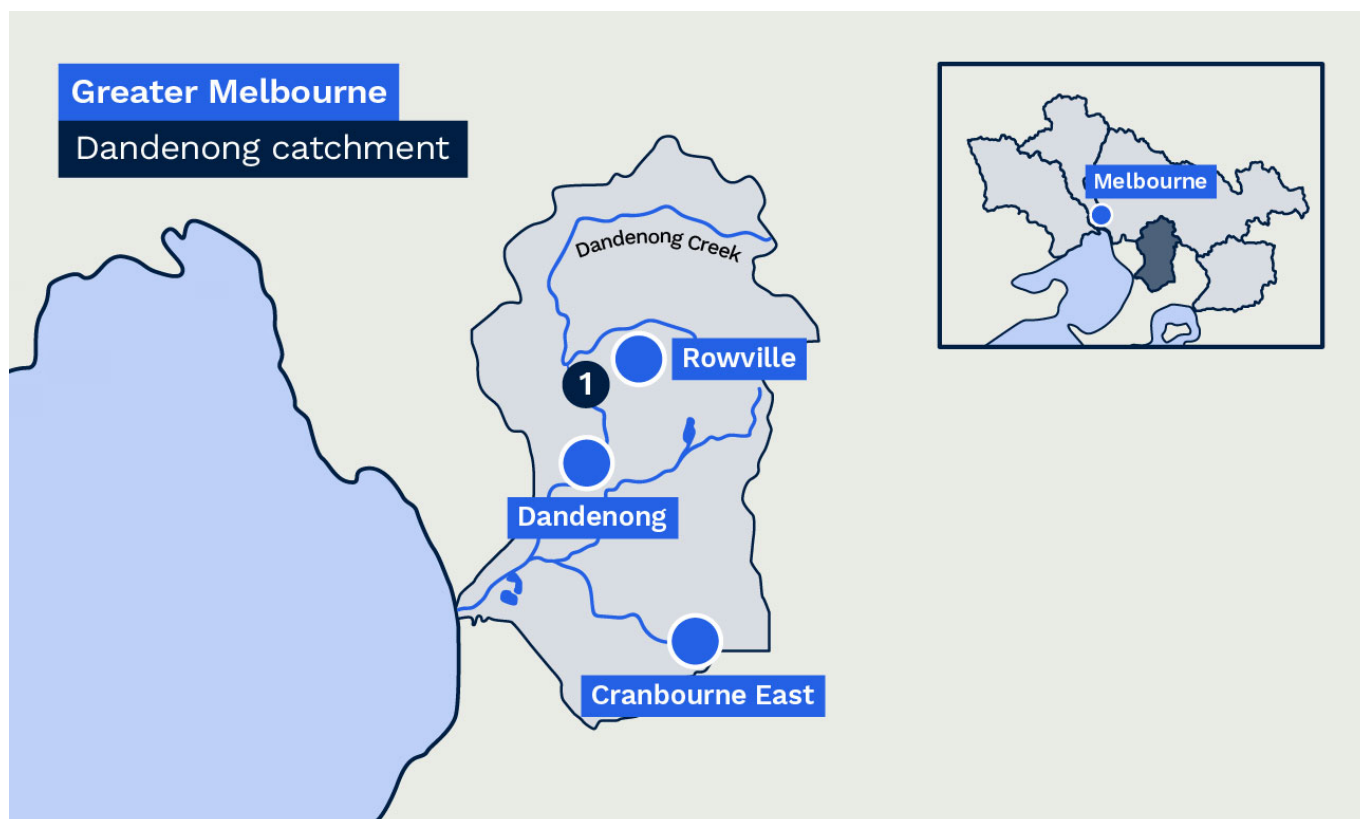
Dandenong catchment

From July 2026, the Bureau of Meteorology is responsible for riverine flood forecasting and flood warning services in Greater Melbourne.

The improved flood warning service includes accurate and timely flood warnings for the Dandenong Creek at Rowville:

Forecast location	Flood level (river height in metres)			Target lead time (to minor level)
	Minor	Moderate	Major	Hours
1 Dandenong Creek at Rowville*	4.6	5.0	5.5	3

* Where possible, flood warnings include a forecast of the peak (maximum) river height including timing at this location.



The Bureau of Meteorology gives as much advance warning as possible before flooding is expected.

What riverine flood warnings does the bureau issue?

Flood watches provide early advice of developing weather that could lead to flooding. Flood watches are issued up to 4 days in advance.

Flood warnings let you know when flooding is likely or is already happening at a particular location.

What is in a flood warning?

Flood warnings can vary and may include a forecast about flood level (minor, moderate or major), including timing and a predicted peak river height at some locations.

What are the target lead times for flood warnings?

The target lead time is how much time you get between your warning and the expected flood level.

You can use this lead time to take action to stay safe.

The lead time is a minimum target that may not always be met. In extreme or unusual weather events, the lead time may be less.

For example, if a forecast location has a target lead time of 3 hours, we aim to issue a warning 3 hours or more before the river is expected to be at least that height.

Why do lead times vary?

Lead times vary between forecast locations because all rivers respond differently to rainfall and runoff.

River size, geography, soil types, land use and nearby infrastructure all impact how quickly water levels rise.

River heights

Flood warnings use different terms to describe river heights:

- **Predicted river height** – this is the water level we forecast at a location. It may be when a river is likely to be at least minor, moderate or major flood levels. It may also forecast the **peak** – the highest level the river is expected to be during the flood.
- **Observed river height** – this is the water level measured at a gauge in the river. It's given in metres and usually measured against a local reference point.

During flood events we update the forecast river heights as more information becomes available.

The actual depth of flood water will vary across the floodplain and every flood is different.
